Graduation and Residency Requirements — To receive a degree from the College of Education, a student must have been registered in the college for at least two long-session semesters or the equivalent. A candidate for a degree must be registered in the college either in residence or in absentia the semester or summer session the degree is to be awarded, and must apply for the degree no later than the specified deadline. The student must have an official degree audit on file prior to applying for the degree (upon completing fifty semester hours of coursework). Sixty hours counted toward the degree must be completed in residence, as well as twenty-four of the last thirty hours counted toward the degree. Coursework taken out-of-residence, including coursework through continuing and distance education or from another institution, will not be allowed in a student's final semester at The University. Students who are graduating in the summer may appeal to take courses at another institution in the first summer term only.
